Overview of Schools Universal Programming, Supports and Interventions: Literacy:

Best Practices Approach to Reading/Phonics/ Writing based on the Science of Reading Interventions: Phonemic awareness, Best Practices in Reading grades 1 & 2, Grade 3 decoding intervention, Grade 3 – extra practice with decodables, Precision Reading

Mathematics:

Best Practices Approach: use of Math talks, Guided Math, small group instruction, Manipulatives, math games

Interventions: Leaps and Bounds; Number Sense Interventions

Sandhills uses a collaborative approach to improving classroom instruction through Grade Teams and Collaborative Teams Meetings, (which include both teachers and support staff.)

Connectivity:

At Sandhills we focus on building connections between students, teachers, parents, and the community. All students are valuable members of our community, and we strive to wrap around and include all students. We focus on building empathy, compassion, and work closely with the Connection Team. The Connection Team delivers small group, full class, and individual programming. We encourage community involvement and classes are strongly encouraged to make connections and serve the larger community.

At Sandhills we stress good citizenship and promote student leadership. Our grade two and three students can learn and practice leadership through the CARE Bear Council.

Social-emotional learning is taught through the Second Step Program, where common school-wide practices and language are developed.

• Insights gleamed from school data (Celebrations and Challenges/Struggles):

Literacy:

- Large gains in decoding occur in grade 1 and 2, by grade 3, gains in decoding are slower, but students grow in fluency and comprehension
 - Grade 1 & 2 have had the biggest gain in decoding
 - Grade 3 have the biggest gains in Fluency and Comprehension, decoding gained by 1 point

• Students can decode words in isolation, practice is required in context so that fluency and comprehension increase. >

Numeracy:

- High percentage of students scoring in the average category of WRAT 5, not many in the above average, good and very good categories.
- This tells us that our students can do the math but causes us to question the depth of student understanding. This indicates that students' conceptual understanding needs to be developed.

Connectivity

- Students like being at school, they feel safe and feel that they are cared about.
- Inclusion of all students is a strength.
- Each class is completing a community kindness project this year to build connections and reach out to the larger community.
- Anxiety, getting along with others, and anger management are the most common socioemotional concerns. These students are being supported through the Second Step Program, small group and full class programming by the Connection Team.
- Leah Martens delivered staff PD on the stages of socioemotional development in children on April 11 PD day. This gave staff insight into what is "normal" age-appropriate development and what they can expect of their students.

School Presentation to the Board: Divisional Priorities

School: La Crete Public School

Date of Report: April 19, 2023

School Context:

As the larger high school in the La Crete area, LCPS strives to provide a variety of programs to meet student needs in grades 7-12. In addition to the academic core programming, LCPS provides Career and Technology Studies in Fabrication, Mechanics, Constructions, Foods, Fashion, and Recreation. LCPS also provides fine arts in Visual Arts and Performing Arts. Students also learn career readiness skills through hands on training on the Simulators at the Essential Services building. 24 Students went through the Earth Movers program with 2 students hired by industry. 8 students went through the Flight simulation program, 3 have since enrolled in Ground School to pursue their private pilot's license, the first step in becoming a commercial pilot.

Students in Junior High transfer mainly from Ridgeview in grade 7. Our high school programming supports students from La Crete, Blumenort, Fort Vermilion, and Buffalo Head Prairie. LCPS works closely with Pathways to provide personalized learning programs for our students.

La Crete Public School has strong ties to the local community, with involvement from parents, guardians, and community members in school events, activities, and decision-making processes. As a school, collaboration with local organizations, businesses, and community leaders is a priority to enhance the educational experiences of our students. Examples include Registered Apprenticeship Programs, Work Placements, mentorships, providing leadership opportunities for students in coaching and leading programs at RCS and SHES.

Our priorities this year as a new administration team have been strengthening our education program to be more student centred, building culture of learning for all, and building connections within community to support learning.

LCPS has an active Student Council. Their role has been two fold: To Build Community and Connections within the school, and to provide feedback on our effectiveness in meeting the needs of students.

The LCPS School Council is an integral part of the LCPS community. In addition to meeting monthly to advise and support LCPS, the School Council is involved through organizing the Hot Lunch, Christmas Concert, Athletic Programs, Performing Arts Programs

Consistent focus on literacy instruction and targeted interventions at all levels has resulted in more students achieving at or above average in all three areas of literacy. This is a result of the work in literacy to develop universal strategies and interventions.





LCPS numeracy data has been historically lower than our literacy data. This year we have created a numeracy team that involves all teachers that teach math in junior and senior high. As a team they have begun to focus on the data and develop their capacities around universal strategies for teaching math. Pam Harris's work on Teaching math from a conceptual framework and the NCTM - Principles to Action have formed the basis for improving classroom instruction.

Students feel accepted by peers and adults. Students feel safe at school. Friends and sports are the main reasons that students enjoy school.

The majority of students in grade 7 and 12 enjoy coming to school. The majority of students in grades 8-11 do not enjoy coming to school. Possible reasons for this, grade 7 is homeroom based and so has a strong class culture and sense of belonging. Grade 12 students are in their final year and may have more direction and purpose in education. Students in grades 8-11 may not have found suitable programs, are experiencing social anxiety or problems with peers. For many years, LCPS has created high school timetables to allow students to finish in January of Grade 12. This means that grade 10 and 11 are very heavy academic years. This schedule does not allow students to take courses that broaden skills, experiences like CTS, Fine Arts and PE. The heavy course load also adds a great deal of stress and workload for students. Furthermore, many students have part time jobs and play sports at school or in the community. Teenage lives have become extremely busy.

Student Council – joined the Canadian Student Leadership Association to access resources to build capacity of student leaders.

Insights gleamed from school data (Celebrations and Challenges/Struggles):

Both literacy and numeracy results are improving from fall to winter. Numeracy is an area that we do need to focus on, specifically on developing a school wide approach for classroom instruction. The Numeracy team will be focusing on Productive Struggle and Promoting Reasoning in math. This requires a shift from memorizing algorithms to helping students developing their understanding of numeracy along the continuum from additive thinking to functional thinking.

Connectivity is an area that we need more data. During the spring survey, we will ask open ended questions that will allow students to anonymously share reasons for why they answered the way they did. Staff and school council has analyzed the data and proposed a variety of reasons and strategies for impacting connectivity. The Collegiate model will have a direct impact on connectivity as students will be able to make more concrete connections between what they are learning and what they want to do after high school. To support this, the CTS teachers are developing career pathways within their programs of studies.

Hockey Academy 2022-2023 Recap

Details:

- Around 150 students participated regularly, with around 175 who participated for a shorter period (for one quad, for instance).
- 2/3 of students were in the La Crete / Buffalo Head groups, 1/3 in High Level
- Once word got around that we were allowing non-FVSD homeschoolers in, around 12 students joined and became faithful attendees. 7 kids from HLCA joined in High Level.
- Attendance was strongest for the groups that fell within school hours (except for the
 after-school Buffalo Head group, who turned out in strong numbers every time despite
 the cold weather).
- As a general template, sessions were 1/3 skating, 1/3 puck skills, 1/3 play but this would vary based on numbers and skill levels.

What I've Learned:

- Separation by skill level is better for everyone, though it will inevitably result in some
 hurt feelings. Beginners get the attention they need to learn the fundamentals and the
 advanced kids can expand their skills sets beyond the basics. It's a big challenge and just
 less fun to have beginners with the most experienced kids. You're almost entirely
 excluded from doing drills involving passing when there is such a wide array of skill
 levels at once.
- Sessions during school hours bring out the most numbers but are harder to schedule especially with the quad system. Vimy Ridge Academy in Edmonton uses a semester system with 5-6 blocks per day, so they are able to keep their Academy scheduled during school hours for every age group all year. High Level has the CTF block which makes it possible.
- The "free program" aspect is amazing and generated a lot of excitement for the participating kids in the region this year. It makes it possible for so many kids to join who otherwise wouldn't. Most of the attendees this year came with an attitude of gratefulness and eagerness to learn. This is made possible by the free ice time and the lack of need for bussing, etc. Vimy Ridge spends millions on bussing and ice time every year, but those kids pay \$4000 per year to join their Academy. The challenge will be balancing the desire to meet every need while only being one person with many students. The other challenge is the enormous numbers of students who sign up and the large groups that result from it. Good problems to have!
- Some of my most passionate and dedicated students were homeschoolers.

Not every student cares about getting better. And that's OK. It's not in my nature to do
things without a purpose but I've realized that the purpose of "fun" is enough for some
of these kids. I'm learning how to make the sessions more engaging for everyone but
it's challenging when there are some kids who are thirsty to get better and some who
aren't.

Notes for the future:

- If we advertised in the Big Deal Bulletin, newspapers, etc. for the Hockey Academy, and made it "FREE for FVSD Students" and an added cost for non-FVSD students, would we pull some kids into the Division? Would some homeschoolers choose a Northern Home program? I think this is something worth exploring before all the homeschoolers have already signed up for their non-division program.
- I plan to expand High Level by splitting the 4-6 group into two different ability groups and adding an early morning session 2x per week for the more skilled / motivated kids. This should work out for next year if we can get the scheduling sorted.
- The Academy serves several exciting purposes. For many students, it's a chance to learn something new and have fun with their classmates. For some, it's an escape from the problems they have at home. For others, it's a chance to hone the craft they are extremely passionate about.
- Already, the Academy is serving as a retention and drawing force for the top hockey kids from the area. Some homeschoolers will stay enrolled in classes if it means they can still attend Academy. Kids who otherwise would feel like they must leave the area to play AAA can stay and know they will still develop as players and not stagnate away from the city. This is stacked with my coaching of the Lumber Barons. Some kids will be coming back to town to join the Academy and play Barons instead of spending tens of thousands outside the Division. There is a strong likelihood that two students will be returning to the area to do exactly this. And another couple of students who wish to one day play Junior A or higher plan to stick around and go the Academy/Junior B route instead of rushing to the city.
